WEEK 4: Strengthened by the Refiner's Fire Growth Opportunity

Day 1: There are times in our journey with God when we may 'feel' God has abandoned, dismissed, or forgotten us. These stretches may even occur during times when we have exercised faithfulness to God, yet find ourselves in difficult or barren places spiritually, emotionally, physically, relationally.

Today, we'll visit the Scripture we explored in session 4 — 1 Kings 19:9-18.

Elijah was a prophet appointed by God. He witnessed God's miraculous works and God's tender mercies. Yet, Elijah became weary, depressed, and lost his bearings. Gripped by fear, he fled.

suffer grief in all kinds of trials. These have come so that the proven genuineness of your faith —of greater worth than gold, which perishes even though refined by fire—may result in praise, glory and honor when Jesus Christ is revealed." Now read this passage again, slowly and with consideration.
What is at the heart of God as He appoints/permits trials of various kinds?
From this passage, what can we glean is the desire of God's heart?
Conclude your time in prayer, inviting God to help you see His refining fire as that which purifies and strengthens your faith. I don't know what you may be encountering in this season of your spiritual journey, bu as His heart for you becomes more evident, may praise, glory, and honor spill forth to Him.
Day 3: In session 4, we saw that Elijah had lost heart. God cared for him with physical nourishment and rest, giving Elijah time to regain strength before God called him forth. What was at the heart of God's Words t Elijah in 1 Kings 19:15-18?
Write out Ephesians 2:10
God has created us to long for 'purpose,' and He desires for us to look to Him for how He desires to work in and through us for Kingdom purposes. God didn't force Elijah to embrace the assignment He placed before him; it was ultimately up to Elijah to decide how he would respond to God's call upon his life. Remember 2 Corinthians 5:7
In our walk of faith, a great deal rests upon how we handle Scripture and how we choose to respond to God's call. As we gleaned from 1 Peter 1:6-7, the genuineness of our faith is most clearly evidenced as we are positioned in the Refiner's fire. Why?
We have looked at James 1 in previous studies, and we'll revisit it again as we wrap up today: James 1:2-4. What is God's heartfelt pursuit as He positions us in the realities of trials and testing—His refining fire?
Close your time by reading Philippians 1:6. What is God's promise to you?

1 Peter 1:6-7 (NIV) states: "In all this you greatly rejoice, though now for a little while you may have had to

Day 5: Today is a praise day. As you reflect upon our session together and this week's Growth Opportunity, hope you have gleaned insights and spiritual stirrings regarding how God's "still small voice" is speaking to you. Again, please don't rush through today's opportunity. We can easily miss what God is desiring to impart to our heart due to busyness, disinterest, hardness of heart, or lack of faith. Consider afresh Psalm 46:10: "Be still and know that I am God."
